The year 2014 will encompass our Bi-annual Radiological Drill for Seabrook Station. These drills will consist of the federal government coming in and evaluating the emergency worker's within the town. They also assess plans in order for Seabrook station to remain open. All trainings and drills are paid by Seabrook.

My department would like to address the many new laws that have come out regarding disasters. They will entail laws regarding sheltering, responding, and ADA compliance and there will be new training opportunities. The Emergency Management Department should also receive their Hummer from the government. These vehicles were offered to the Police Department and they were generous enough to donate one to our department. Having a vehicle like this is so important and beneficial when responding to disasters.

The Emergency Management department is hoping that 2014 will mimic the previous year and have no major disasters to respond to in our town. As always if disaster strikes, we are always ready to go and respond at the drop of a dime. We look forward to serving the Town of Newton and its Residents in 2014.
