HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The mild winter and dry summer of 2016 has allowed the highway department to be able to continue along with the scheduled road repairs under the Roadway Condition Evaluation.

Three roads had deteriorated metal pipes and were replaced with new ADS pipes. A total of 80 feet of pipe (40' of 18' and 40' of 12") was laid on Gale Village Road, 580 feet of pipe (540' of 10" and 40' of 24") was laid on Maple Avenue, and 40' of 18" pipe was laid on Fernwood Drive.

Upgrades were done on Gale Village Road, consisting of 1760' of reclamation with a new 2" base pavement, and on Maple Avenue, with 1920' of reclamation with 2" of new base and 1.5" of asphalt top.

After receiving long awaited approval and permits from the State of NH DES, work has begun on the Country Pond Road culvert. A 60" ADS pipe was installed inside the existing deteriorated metal culvert and repairs will continue in this area in the upcoming year.

NEWTON HISTORICAL SOCIETY

In 2016 the Newton Historical Society celebrated the 45th anniversary of its 1971 founding. The society was officially incorporated two years later in 1973.

In March of 2016 the Newton Board of Selectmen voted to dedicate the 2015 Town Annual Report to the Historical Society. The Society provided photos and a write-up for the report. The photos were used on the front cover of the report.

In the spring, the Newton Girl Scout Troop 10040 visited the Marshall House and Primary School Museums.

A list of all Marshall House Museum artifacts, as well as photos were submitted to the Town's new insurance carrier.

Three historical type presentations were held at the town hall. "Whacky songs that made us laugh; "Haunted Portsmouth, NH: Legends & Lore from the Colonial City by the Sea" and, "Liberty is our Motto: Songs & Stories of the musical Hutchinson Family". These presentations are offered free to the community. As is our custom, all donations received at the presentations were matched by the society and given to the Newton Food Pantry.

The Fall Festival fund raiser, held in mid-October, on a lovely fall evening, was hosted, and sponsored by the North Shore Bank. This was the first year that North Shore Bank hosted the event. The previous nine years it was hosted by the Merrimac Savings Bank, which is now part of North Shore Bank. We are very happy to report that both North Shore Bank CEO David LaFlamme and President Kevin Tierney have committed to continue the banks sponsorship of this event. We greatly appreciate their support.

This year's festival was again a great success, both financially and attendance wise. There were many prize drawings, historical displays, and entertaining slide shows. Thanks to all our sponsors and attendees. The building was again filled to capacity.

To celebrate the occasion, engraved Newton, NH Historical Society ink pens were distributed to all attendees.

The society made a cash donation to the New Hampshire Humanities Council. The council provides the society with financial grants to facilitate the historic presentations we put on each year for the community.

In November, the society hosted the 22nd Annual Book Award reception for the Boston based Historic New England group. The award winner was Chris Hadsel of Vermont whose group, Curtains without Borders, restored the two Newton Stage curtains in 2014.
